

Message from the Director of Public Health

Welcome to our 2010 Annual Report! We continue to work hard to assure conditions exist in which all of our citizens can be healthy. The following pages offer a brief review of some of the accomplishments by Clay County Public Health Center during 2010. Our efforts led to: 1) Successfully completing the 2010 H1N1 vaccination campaign for all those who wanted protection; 2) Promotion of our services through a reorganized user-friendly website (www.clayhealth.com) that now includes Facebook and Twitter access; 3) A successful intervention by our skilled CD staff to quickly treat a case of tuberculosis in an educational setting which prevented the spread of that disease into our communities.

Other highlights during 2010 include:

- 1) Assuming a leadership role in a comprehensive community health assessment for Clay County by participating in the Vision North 2010 process. This community wide effort, which began in the summer of 2010 involves stakeholders from all across the Northland coming together to identify priority issues impacting our residents. Action plans will be developed by a variety of stakeholders to address those issues and CCPHC will participate fully on those issues that fall under the functions of public health.
- 2) Began implementing a new and improved data collection software system for all programs that is HIPAA compliant, meets the "meaningful use" criteria established by federal law and prepares us for the new electronic health record component also required at the federal and state level.
- 3) Continuing to practice leadership by example by being one of the first local health departments in Missouri to adopt the new FDA Model Food Code into our county health ordinances.
- 4) Our commitment to provide the highest standard of public health services to the residents of the county. We began the process of preparing our organization to achieve national accreditation. It means that CCPHC will meet standardized criteria which strengthen our public health department and therefore the services we provide. This will result in demonstrated accountability and improved quality for you, the taxpayer. It will also help us achieve improved health outcomes in all communities in Clay County. We have already begun a Quality Improvement Program that will evaluate and standardize our programs and services. Simply put, we are working towards being the quality community health prevention agency you deserve.

What is Public Health?



Vision North brings together community stakeholders representing businesses, hospitals, schools, local government, health departments, faith-based and civic organizations to create a vision and action plans for the future of Clay and Platte Counties .

A successful local public health department must incorporate its partners at the academic level (schools of research, public health, environmental sciences, etc.), the medical field, school systems and countless others in making up the public health system.

Public health is not the physical building in each jurisdiction with “health department” on its door. It actually requires all those listed above to work together to do the following:

Use data and science to protect and improve the health of the community through education, promotion of healthy lifestyles and research for disease and injury prevention. Public health professionals understand and analyze the effect on health of genetics, personal choice and the environment in order to develop programs that protect the health of you, your family and your neighbors.

Protect the health of entire populations through disease control measures. These populations can be as small as a neighborhood or as big as an entire county.

Stop problems from happening OR from reoccurring through implementing educational programs, developing policies, administering services that are not regularly available, and conducting research/assessments.

Advocate for overcoming barriers and health disparities in populations and promoting health care equity, quality and accessibility for all.

What We Do

Clay County Public Health Center's strategic functions are to assess the health status indicators and outcomes; to prioritize those indicators, engage stakeholders and policy makers to make changes that will improve those outcomes and finally to assure that what we are doing is working and improving the health of the community.

In March 2010, CCPHC reorganized from four divisions to three. The **Division of Administration** supports the operations of the entire health department - health administration, human resources, IT, finance, procurement, medical records and registration. A new section, **Health Policy and Planning**, has been added to Administration. This section is responsible for collecting and analyzing data that is specific to Clay County from numerous resources. It also includes an Epidemiologist and several Epidemiology specialists who gather and analyze data on communicable and chronic diseases. This data is used to help develop preventions programs and services. **Health Policy and Planning** also is engaged in planning activities to identify what are local public health responsibilities in a coordinated emergency response as it relates to outbreaks of disease.

The Division of Environmental Health Protection includes environmental health professionals who protect community health by monitoring and enforcing regulations of those that provide consumer services such as restaurants, private sewage disposal system installers, lodging establishments, and recreational waters (public indoor/outdoor pools). They also provide training and education to those in the service industry, which further helps to prevent disease from occurring.

The **Division of Community Health Promotion** has three sections with multiple programs and services in each. Those sections include **Communicable Disease Control**, **Behavioral/Community Health Education** and **Chronic Disease Prevention**. These sections not only provide direct services which help prevent the spread of disease but they also provide educational programs/services which promote healthy behaviors and enable our residents to live healthier lifestyles. The programs/services provided by this division are created as a direct result of the health assessment and data work done by of **Health Policy and Planning Section**. **This important connection means we are able to respond to the identified needs that are specific to Clay County residents.**

Board Governance



The Board of Trustees is responsible for adopting policies for the operation of the Clay County Public Health Center and for setting the annual public health tax levy rate.

The Board is instrumental in designing the strategic plan, implementing public health programs, and adopting public health ordinances and policies designed for the improvement of health for all who live, work, and visit Clay County. The Board of Health was established in 1953 under Chapter 205 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri. Board members are elected to four-year terms.

The Board of Trustees meets at the health center located at 800 Haines Drive, Liberty, MO. on the **second Thursday of each month at 6:30 p.m.** The meetings are open to the public.



Spotlight on Sharon Fletcher

Sharon was appointed to the Board of Health in September 1999 to fill the remaining three years of an unexpired term. In 2000, she was elected Vice-Treasurer and from 2001 through 2010 she served as Secretary to the Board.
